tium's approved day schools served 390 students from 20 member and 33 non-member districts. An additional 100 youngsters received services through our school-based and consultation services, and over 500 individuals benefited from our regional conferences and professional development workshops.

The combination of a surplus in our operating budget, plus the generous support of our friends and donors in FY 2016, enabled us to make significant advances in improving our physical space and expanding the technology available to our educators and our students. The 2016-2017 school year started with a newly paved parking lot and accessible walkway, freshly painted hallways and stairwells, and many new computers, laptops, Chromebooks, ipads, and augmentative communication devices in our classrooms.

What does this mean for our students? It means that high school students who struggle with anxiety and depression are able to prepare for college; young adults with autism receive vocational experiences that prepare them for independent employment; children with significant multiple disabilities receive all of their specialized therapies in a cheerful and positive school environment; and teenagers struggling with addictions learn to have "healthy and sober fun." Your support means that in addition to the "basics" of the school curriculum, our students are able to go on field trips, work with therapy dogs, use the newest technology to assist with communication and learning, and access state-of-art curriculum and therapies.







### Philanthropic Development:

- Revenue of \$175.555
- \$20,000 donated to our Tribute Program
- \$47,000+ received from grants (supporting technology, much needed equipment for our most physically disabled students, vocational programming, advancements in our arts programming and additions to our athletic field and track)
- \$22,000 was raised during our annual appeal; third highest year
- \$35,000 in major donor support in major donor support allocated for assistive and communication technology programs and supporting devices, eye gaze software and more; this level of technology provides our most severely challenged students a means to express basic wants and needs as well as access to their curriculum
