June 4: Trinity Sunday, observed in the Western Christian faith

June 8: Corpus Christi, a Catholic holiday celebrating the body and blood of Christ in the Eucharist

June 14: Flag Day in the US

June 16: Martyrdom of Guru Arjan Dev, the first Sikh martyr, observed by members of the Sikh faith.

June 16: Feast of the Most Sacred Heart, in the Roman Catholic Church June 19: Juneteenth, established as a federal holiday in June 2021, to honor the day in 1865 when slaves in June 28-9: (sundown to Texas and Louisiana were finally June 2: Native American Citizenship freed, two months after the end of the festival commemorating Ibrahim's Civil War.

> June 19: New Church Day, according to some Christians, this day in 1770 was the beginning of the New Christian Church.

June 21: National Indigenous Peoples Day or First Nations Day, giving recognition to the indigenous populations affected by colonization in Canada

June 21: Litha, the summer solstice celebrated by Wiccans and Pagans.

June 27-8: (sundown to sundown) Waqf al Arafa, the second day of pilgrimage in the Islamic faith

sundown) Eid-al-Adha, an Islamic (Abraham's) devotion to Allah (God).

June 28: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ+) Pride Day in the United States. It occurs to honor the Stonewall Riots that occurred on June 28, 1969.

INTRODUCING THE GENDER NEUTRAL TITLE MX

Mx (pronounced 'mix') is a gender neutral title used for people who do not identify with the traditional titles Ms, Miss, Mrs or Mr. The earliest known use of Mx is believed to be in an article published in 1976 and it has gradually gained popularity in society. There are different schools of thought around use of language in the disability community: Person first language and Identity first language are two types that are described in this article. Best practice is described as asking the individual how they prefer to be referred to and be open minded; expect that you won't get language right 100% of the time and that's okay!
